February 2021 Road Report

Deep Creek District 1:

Crews worked throughout the month clearing snow. Time was spent between storms using the snow blower on both Wilson and Hastings Mesas. Several storms dropped larger amounts with wind drifts causing some areas to become difficult to push back. Slide paths along Ophir Road continue to be monitored and may need to be treated if loading continues. Used oil from some of the local mechanic shops was dropped off for use in the oil heaters. This helps reduce heating costs during winter months. Crews worked on rebuilding the excavator bucket that has become worn out. Work in the Pathfinder Pit continued getting ready for this summer's crushing project. Personnel began working on preparing equipment for summer projects by going through servicing and inspecting vehicles that have been parked since last fall.

Norwood District 2:

Norwood personnel spent most of the month plowing snow and sanding roads as needed. Snow fences were installed on County Roads 44ZS and W44 to prevent and help reduce drifting. Crack seal equipment was moved from the Norwood Shop to the Egnar Shop. During breaks between storms and when weather allows, crews will begin crack seal projects on the western roads working east. Crew performed vehicle and equipment maintenance and repairs as needed.

Basin and Egnar Districts 3 and 4:

Snow removal was performed in both districts during the month of February. One employee from Basin spent time in Egnar assisting with snow removal when needed after wind and heavy snow occurred. Snow ridges were pushed back between storms making room for future amounts. Pothole repair was completed on County Roads P20 and U29E after frost heave caused several major holes to develop. Cattle guard A-frames were repaired on County Roads 13R, S22 and 20R. Vehicle and equipment maintenance and repairs were performed as needed in both districts. Crews stayed busy working around the shops cleaning and completing small projects. The water valve at Indian Springs was repaired in accordance with our agreement with BLM.

February saw many meetings and discussions on both upcoming and continuing projects.

Road and Bridge met with the USFS to discuss plans on types of bridges to be installed on Tomboy Rd CR K68. Plans to incorporate gluelam structures led the way. The USFS will move forward with ordering three 20 ft. structures that will be installed over two years in coordination with our County Road Crews. The main obstacle will be getting the larger heavier pieces up past the switchbacks, cliffs and tunnel. Future meetings are planned to work out the details, however the initial plans have begun.

Road and Bridge met with USFS to perform our annual Schedule A meeting to discuss work that was completed last year and projects and maintenance work planned for this upcoming season. Culverts and road base were among the priority topics discussed. County District Supervisors will work with USFS engineering to plan and schedule culvert replacement and repair to rough sections of road where drainage needs to be improved.

The Applebaugh Bridge was discussed between County staff, the HOA and Russell Engineering. Work continues on various options to reduce costs in an effort to keep the project on track. Removal and repurpose of the old structure, traffic control and material are areas where to focus. There is another bridge project in Mancos going out for bid that may lend more ideas once the bids are received by CDOT.

Road and Bridge met with Mountain Village to discuss the 2021 phase of the waterline replacement project in the Ski Ranches area. This year's section will impact High Noon, Ridge Rd and Saddle Horn Ln. Special Conditions for the project will remain the same with no major changes from the previous year's scope.

Crew's from all districts attended the MSHA annual refresher training this month. Personnel saw a change from past formats due to COVID restrictions. Instead of one day, crews were split into two groups to keep each class under 7. Future annual classes are intended to be returned to in person, however this format satisfied federal requirements this calendar year.

Road and Bridge sent out invitations to bid on our new compactor trailers we will be adding to the fleet this spring. We will be working on invitations for bids to purchase tractors to pull the new trailers next month. Look for these this spring when we begin grading roads.

March 2021 Road Report

Deep Creek District 1:

Snow removal continued on winter maintained roads in the Deep Creek District. Between storms, crews took advantage of warm weather to begin patching potholes that developed on the paved roads during the winter months. Bids were received for restriping work later this spring. Welding and fabrication was performed on several pieces of equipment. Work also continued preparing trucks for summer projects. Crew members from Deep Creek assisted with crack seal in Egnar. Work clearing snow and opening CR 58P had begun by the end of the month.

Norwood District 2:

Our Norwood crew removed snow several times this month. Faded stop signs were replaced at the intersections of County Roads X45, AA42/43ZN, AA42/43ZN, and 46X/X45. Warmer weather allowed crews to begin work grading AA42, W44, 43ZN and 47Z. The Norwood Crew assisted with crack seal in the Egnar area. Crew spent time repairing vehicles and equipment. Time was also spent picking up supplies and preparing for spring and summer projects.

Basin and Egnar Districts 3 and 4:

Personnel from both districts worked on snow removal and cutting ridges in response to wind and snow storms during throughout the month. The roads hardest hit were County Roads 31U, U29E, H1, 29U and 23R. As the weather improved, grading on County Roads 19Q and U29E was performed. A cattle guard was repaired on CR S22. Crack seal was done on CR H1 with assistance from the other Districts until the crack seal equipment began experiencing issues. The remainder of the month was spent hauling gravel to County Road 19Q for surface prep and drainage improvements.

March was a busy month for Road and Bridge. Planning and preparation from the purchase of equipment and materials, accepting and signing bids for contracted work, to saying goodbye to a long time employee, continuing our search for new employees and working on other administrative matters within the Department.

Planning and communication on the glulam bridges for Tomboy Rd continued with the USFS. Discussion with Newmont and Idarado regarding cooperative use of a helicopter this summer for the transport and staging of the larger bridge components was included. Timing of both projects will be instrumental in utilizing the flight time for both the bridge project and the waterline project the mine is working on.

Crews from Road and Bridge attended Flagger recertification training in Nucla. This certification is a requirement for all personnel working and performing flagging operations on public roads in the State.

Road and Bridge sent one person from their administrative staff to Traffic Control Supervisor Training in Grand Junction. This training is required for the County to provide Traffic Control Inspection and Supervision on State and federally funded projects. This certification was part of the discussion regarding reducing costs associated with the Applebaugh Bridge Project. It should also help reduce costs on our CMAQ paving project later this year.

Bids received for gravel crushing this year were good news. Road and Bridge moved forward with proposal to the winning contractor to increase the amounts crushed. After working with the contractor and County staff, a contract was signed. Instead of crushing 30,000 yds this year and 15,000 yds next year, Road and Bridge was able to crush 60,000 yds this calendar year. This was made possible by working with the contractor on scheduling. The original schedule was intended to be for two years. At the request of the contractor crushing at all pits will be completed in one. We are excited to add the additional amount to our stockpiles.

This year, San Miguel County Road and Bridge worked with Larimer County Road and Bridge to present the New Commissioners Orientation for Colorado Counties Incorporated. This training is intended to give new county commissioners an idea of the roles and responsibilities of their road

and bridge departments. Typically, this training is performed in person, however with current health restrictions and safety protocols, it was performed via Zoom.

Dust control Bids were received. We will be working with Desert Mountain out of Durango, Colorado this season. Road and Bridge is moving toward applying dust control independently. This will be the first season, so our expectations are in learning the process and building this program. Storage tanks will be loaned to us this year and the contractor will assist with some of the longer roads while we learn our capabilities. Next month will be busy working out the finer details and getting ready for May applications.

With the purchase of the Wobbly rubber tire compactors, Road and Bridge has begun searching for tractors to pull them. We look forward to seeing these in action next month.

Finally, Road and Bridge said farewell to one of our long term employees this month. Tony Gallob submitted his retirement notice and will be spending the rest of his spring and summer months on time with his family. Tony completed many, many years of quality and dedicated service to this community and to this County. We will both miss him and wish him the best on his retirement and in his search for new adventures. Good luck and Godspeed Tony.

April 2021 Road Report

Deep Creek District 1:

April started a bit cold with a couple storms requiring snow to be removed from roads in the higher elevations. Crew worked clearing the remainder of the snow from County Road 58P opening the top of the mesa to traffic. Pothole repair was completed on roads T60, 63L, 60M, 57P, 56V and on several roads within the community of Placerville. Warmer weather at the end of the month allowed crews to begin grading roads. County Roads 57P, 60M, 63L, D65, 63A, M44, 58P and T60 were graded for the first time this year. Additional grading will be performed prior to dust control being applied along the roads scheduled to receive treatment. Material to be crushed this summer was pushed up at the Pathfinder Pit. Vehicle and equipment maintenance, repair and fabrication was performed in preparation for summer use. Our new compactor trailer and tractor was made ready for service. The Supervisor from the Deep Creek Shop assisted with interviews in the search for new employees. Hopes are that we can find quality applicants that can fill the needs of the department.

Norwood District 2:

Our Norwood crew was able to spend most of their time on road projects and gravel pit preparation. Crews were able to grade County Roads 44ZS, 31U, 45M and M44. Pothole patching was completed on Roads Y43 and 44ZS. Sign repair was done on County Roads L40 and 44ZS. The remainder of the time was spent moving topsoil from the material site in the Norwood Pit. Crews performed vehicle maintenance and repairs as needed. There was a change in the crushing schedule with the contractor completing work in Montrose County ahead of schedule. The original plan was to start in the Klondike on May 3rd, after the winter habitat restrictions were lifted in the area. In an effort to keep working and to be able to crush at all our sites, the crushing dates were swapped with the Norwood Pit. This will help ensure we are able to get everything completed this year.

Crew were able to finish hauling gravel on CR 19Q. After that, time was spent grading County Roads 19Q, 16R, P16, U29W, 31U and 25R. Crew from both Districts worked cleaning the shop and equipment and preparing for the quickly approaching spring and summer months. Vehicle and equipment maintenance and repairs were performed as needed. Basin will be the first to receive dust control from our new distributor truck.

Road and Bridge Fleet Mechanics:

April was busy for our mechanics as they worked very diligently ensuring our vehicles and equipment are ready for the season. They were able to complete the following work throughout the County.

Unit 291, International Water Truck – Replace differential, repair back up lights, repair backup alarm, install spot mirrors, replace u-joints on short drive line, replace batteries, replace all 10 tires, remove front spray bar, replace front hub caps, repair power steering leak, repair inoperable marker lights, repair rotted out floor boards, install DOT tape, replace clutch brake and adjust clutch, perform engine service, replace wiper blades, install block heater, replace steer shocks, perform alignment, replace hood stop bushings, adjust fan belts, adjust brakes, install federal and county decals, perform DOT Annual inspection, replace u-joints in long drive line, service water pump, service differentials, service transmission

Unit 371, 2004 Mack Water Truck – Had Kenworth paint the cab, install federal and county decals, replace oil pressure switch, replace fuel tank isolator straps, perform engine service, install mud flap reflectors, install strobe light, replace vice clamp and seals on rear spray bar, refurbish headlight lenses, replace brake valve buttons, replace D/S windshield, replace wiper blades, repair dome light, repair broken welds on rear spray bar, replace work lights, replace P/S leaf spring pack, service both differentials, service transmission, replace steer axle wheel bearings and races, replace carrier bearing, replace differential output seal, replace all brake shoes and drums, adjust brakes, perform DOT Annual inspection, replace speed sensor

Unit 372, 2003 Freightliner Water Truck – Install spray bar and accessories for spray bar, performed pre-job inspection, replace strobe light, install DOT reflective tape, performed DOT Annual inspection, performed engine service, repair coolant leak, relocate washer reservoir and pump, replace 3 batteries, Replace steer axle hub caps

Unit 295, 2007 International Truck – Replace trailer cord connector and repair melted wiring, replace cooling system surge tank

Unit 265, 2002 Ford F150 – Replace transmission pan gasket and replace transmission filter

April seemed to go by fast. Plans, permits, contracts and agreements seemed to take up most of the month.

Road and Bridge signed another contract with Eaton Services for the installation of the next Fuel Master system that is scheduled for the Basin Shop. Egnar will be the last facility and is expected to be completed next year. This system will give us the ability to accurately track the fuel at all of our sites.

Supervisors and lead personnel performed interviews in the search for new employees to fill several vacancies on each end of the County. We had numerous applicants who were all uniquely qualified. We are pleased to be welcoming three new employees who will be starting the beginning of May.

Road and Bridge worked with County staff, USFS and Black Hills Energy to complete the permit for the Telluride #2 BHE gas line relocation project. While we were processing the permit, BHE changed the scope of the proposed work and access to the area. This caused a delay on both the issuance of the permits and the start of the project.

Alpine Engineering completed the final revisions for the CMAQ K69 Paving Project. Designs were submitted to CDOT for final review and approval. Once we have the final approval, we will begin the process of advertising the project and inviting bids. Plans are on track to complete paving this fall.

Dear Representative Catlin, Representative Kipp, Senator Coram, and Senator Hansen:

On February 22, 2021 we sent a letter requesting, pursuant to your authority under C.R.S. §2-3-108, that you ask the Legislative Audit Committee to call for a special audit to be conducted by the Office of the State Auditor ("OSA") on the Colorado Division of Property Taxation ("DPT"), a division of the Colorado Department of Local Affairs. Eagle and La Plata Counties submitted similar requests. These requests stemmed from a pattern of inappropriate communications between the DPT's then Deputy Director, Curt Settle, and the Managing Director of Duff and Phelps, Bruce Cartwright, discovered by our counties pursuant to various open records requests. We all provided documents to support our concerns that the leadership, performance, and operational protocols of the DPT lack transparency and have deviated from legislative intent.

Subsequent to that letter, we were invited to a meeting of the State Board of Equalization ("SBOE) on March 26 conducted by Rep. Kipp. Commissioner Holstrom participated on behalf of San Miguel County.

Commissioner Holstrom has expressed her frustration with the meeting. First we were not given much input on how or why the meeting was to be held - and how it specifically related to our request for an audit. Instead we were invited to attend the BOE meeting with the following agenda item noted.

Pursuant to the state board's authority in the Colorado Constitution, article X, section 15(2), the state board will discuss supervision of the Property Tax Administrator including consideration of

letters from the Eagle County Board of Commissioners, the San Miguel County Board of Commissioners, and the La Plata County Board of Commissioners regarding Request for Performance Audit of the Colorado Division of Property Taxation.

Our county attorney had received a voice mail from the SBOE's attorney general on March 24th that indicated they would allow public comment if we wanted to do so during their meeting on this topic. She said that they were not going to set a time limit for public comment in the event that we were planning on presenting them with information - all they were asking for was to be respectful of the board's time.

Commissioner Holstrom notes it seemed from the start that there was a foregone conclusion after the Board's Executive Session that started the meeting. She felt her particular input was discounted and that important questions from the other counties on the call were completely ignored or made light of. As it was a public meeting of the BOE, participants included the employee and the individual with whom the employee met on these issues. It was a strange, awkward and unproductive meeting - and not an audit nor a real response to our request.

Needless to say, the Commissioners were incredibly disappointed with the way in which that meeting was handled and the lack of responsiveness to our concerns. It was clear during the meeting that the SBOE was not interested in conducting an independent investigation related to the issues identified by Eagle, La Plata and San Miguel.

Approximately a week ago, we were forwarded documents obtained by Eagle County pursuant to their records request for communications related to the multiple audit requests and communication between Joanna Groff, SBOE Chairwoman Hullinghorst, and all of you prior to the March 26 meeting. Those documents are attached. Based on these communications, it seems clear to us that there was never an intent to address our concerns in an independent and transparent manner:

- 1) shortly after Eagle County Board of Commissioners made a request for audit, which was months after they sent JoAnn Groff a letter of concern without a response, one of the representatives called for a meeting with Ms. Groff and all of the representatives addressed in Eagle County's letter (Exhibits 1 & 2: February 10 and 11 emails);
- 2) shortly after the San Miguel County Commissioners made its request for audit, you received an email from Representative Kipp stating that our concerns had been handled to her satisfaction, and to talk to her before taking any action on San Miguel Commissioners' request (Exhibits 3 & 4: February 24 emails). Ms. Groff emailed all of you the letter she sent to Eagle County (Exhibit 5: February 25 email); and
- 3) at the very least Ms. Groff, Chairwoman Hullinghorst, Rep. Kipp and Sen. Hansen appear to be involved in communication to formulate a "plan" in advance of the March 26 SBOE meeting (Exhibit 6: March 2 text).

The General Assembly created statutory processes that subject state agencies to independent oversight and audits so that the citizens of Colorado can be assured that their elected officials and public servants are conducting themselves with the utmost integrity. The DPT, as a state agency,

is intended to be a valuable resource for elected county assessors throughout the state and the public alike – but this only works if the DPT and its staff operate within appropriate legal and ethical jurisdictional boundaries and comply with their statutory mandate.

We respectfully submit this second request for you to request the Legislative Audit Committee to recommend the OSA conduct a review of the DPT's jurisdictional and operational parameters to preclude these types of abuses from happening again at further taxpayer expense.



RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF SAN MIGUEL COUNTY, COLORADO, IN URGING ALL CITIZENS TO DECLINE TO SIGN ANY PETITION THAT SUPPORTS PLACING INITIATIVE 16 (PAUSE) ON THE NOVEMBER 22, 2022 OR ANY FUTURE BALLOT

RESOLUTION #2021 -	
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WHEREAS, on March 17, 2021, a citizens' initiative entitled "Protect Animals from Unnecessary Suffering and Exploitation: (PAUSE) was approved by the Title Board of the Colorado Secretary of State for petition to the November 2022 General Election as Initiative 16; and

WHEREAS, the initiative will broadly redefine animal sexual abuse in a manner that will criminalize many common and necessary veterinary and animal husbandry practices; and

WHEREAS, the initiative will additionally require tremendous delays, sometimes years, prior to the humane harvesting of livestock; and

WHEREAS, these delays (of up to one-quarter of an animal's statutorily defined natural lifespan) will greatly increase the costs to livestock producers by forcing the continuation of feeding this livestock past their prime harvest as well as causing meat of lower quality to be sold to the consumer at higher purchase prices; and

WHEREAS, the means to humanely put livestock down is the same whether the livestock has lived one-quarter of their natural lifespan or any fraction thereof, thus the age at which this occurs should not be subject to criminal offense; and

WHEREAS, these increases in livestock production costs will put Colorado producers at an unfair disadvantage to surrounding states and countries that compete with for the same markets causing potential Colorado business harm and/or closures; and

WHEREAS, the governor's spokeswoman Shelby Wieman said Governor Polis "agrees with farmers and ranchers that the PAUSE ballot initiative would hurt Colorado and destroy jobs, and he opposes it": and

WHEREAS, the San Miguel County Board of Commissioners never supports the infliction of needless suffering of animals and recognizes that our cattle and livestock producers take great effort to treat their animals humanely.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of San Miguel County, Colorado that:

- 1. the Board opposes this Initiative 16 and urges the Governor of Colorado and Commissioner of the Colorado Department of Agriculture to do the same;
- 2. the Board urges all citizens of San Miguel County to decline to sign any petition that supports placing Initiative 16 (PAUSE) on the November 22, 2022 or any future ballot; and

3. The Board urges that all people that care about agriculture, 4-H programs, and the well-being of animals – be they livestock, pets, service animals or other – take action to defeat this measure if it makes it to any ballot.

CAUSE ANIMAL SUFFERING

The authors of Initiative #16 propose to **remove all authority of veterinary** medicine and animal care as it relates to certain health and animal welfare

procedures, replacing the entire scientific discipline of animal husbandry and veterinary medicine with the follow words:

"Nothing in this subsection (5) shall be construed to prohibit ANY PERSON.

DISPENSING CARE TO AN ANIMAL IN THE INTEREST OF IMPROVING THAT ANIMAL'S

"But wait! They say right there that we can still do things to improve an animal's health!"

Unfortunately, without any further definition as to what is meant to "improve" or what aspect of "health" is covered, **individuals caring for animals have no scientific and medical protocol to support their decisions** - leaving them wide open for criminal prosecution based on someone's subjective interpretation of what that language might mean.





INCREASE FOOD INSECURITY...

...for ALL Coloradans, but especially for children in single-parent homes and the elderly due to the rise in food cost resulting from imported food products.

Colorado already struggles with a state average food insecurity rate of 9.9% (2018, pre-pandemic). To push for statutory law that would virtually eliminate Colorado agriculture, food costs would soar as the former Colorado-proud foods would have to be brought in from out of state.

The majority of the highest food insecurity rates in Colorado also correlate with almost all of Colorado's food deserts. As income levels in these rural areas drop, food insecurity will sky rocket.





DISRUPT YOUTH PROGRAMS

Although many youth programs such as 4-H have activities that make participation possible for children in urban areas who are unable to lovingly raise animals, the vast majority of 4-H kiddos live in rural areas.

Initiative #16 uses language that would eliminate many of the animal care practices used to raise healthy animals. Youth programs would be further disrupted due to the decrease in number of events at which they show their animal projects. If the sponsors for the county fair are out of business, no more county fair!

4-H and other youth programs teach children invaluable life skills - from socialization and communication skills to entrepreneurship. Without said programs operating at full-force, children in high-risk areas will lose one of the few positive outlets in their communities that enables them to truly grasp the importance of animal welfare as well as carry on the legacy that is agriculture.





JEOPARDIZE ANIMAL RESCUES

Spaying and neutering are an important part of what animal rescues and shelters do to prevent overpopulation, minimize spread of disease, and discourage back-yard breeders from exploiting animals.

Colorado is one of many states that, as of 2019, has a mandatory sterilization law in place for all animals being adopted out from a shelter or rescue. While spaying and neutering doesn't always "improve" an animals health (depending on how "improvement" is defined), it does keep fewer unplanned pets off the street out of "kill" shelters or abusive homes.

Unfortunately, Initiative #16 has proposed to remove the portion of our current

Colorado statute that says:

"Nothing in this part 2 shall affect animal care otherwise authorized by law."

Instead, they are proposing to include the following language:

" IN CASE OF ANY CONFLICT BETWEEN ANIMAL CARE OTHERWISE AUTHORIZED BY LAW, THIS PART 2 SHALL CONTROL."

The problem? As mentioned before, they removed **all authority of veterinary medicine and animal care as it relates to certain health and animal welfare procedures,** leaving "animal care" wide open for interpretation.





DISCREDIT UNIVERSITY RESEARCH FACILITIES

As many Coloradans know, we are home to Colorado State University Department of Biomedical Sciences which houses one of the most revolutionary equine reproductive laboratories in the country. While the language in Initiative #16 does

provide an exception for scientific research, the CSU Equine Lab also provides their services to the general public.

In the event that Initiative #16 makes its way to the ballot and is tragically voted in, how will CSU and other research facilities justify operating with members of the general public as part of their client base? Would clients be subject to criminal prosecution as the artificial insemination techniques used may not be considered "improving that animal's health"? Without clear answers, our university research programs and other biomedical facilities may take a hit because clients or study participants would not be willing to risk a criminal charge.

This would effectively destroy the programs' credibility and bring genetic research to a grinding halt in the state of Colorado.

Ranching and farming has been an integral part of Colorado's economy for generations. The livestock industry alone boasts an over \$5 billion dollar haul and a

\$1 billion beef export market. All together, the agricultural sector generates more than \$40 billion annually, providing over 170,000 jobs.

WHEREAS, farming and livestock businesses are the backbones of rural counties and this measure will cost jobs and devastate communities as well as raise food prices for us all; and

WHEREAS, it has been reported that the Governor of Colorado and Attorney General agrees that the PAUSE initiative would hurt Colorado and destroy jobs.

- **WHEREAS**, according to the Colorado Department of Agriculture, agriculture contributes \$21.9 million to the Fremont County economy; and
- **WHEREAS**, the economic impact to farmers, ranchers, meat cutters, veterinarians and other related industries would be tremendous and negative; and
- **WHEREAS**, it has been reported that even the Governor of Colorado agrees that the PAUSE initiative would "hurt Colorado, and destroy jobs"; and
- **WHEREAS**, this Board abhors the infliction of needless suffering of animals and recognizes that our cattle and livestock producers take great effort to treat their animals humanely.






GREEN LINES BELOW SHOW PROJECT AREA COMPARED TO TOWN





CPW Regional Partnerships Executive Summary

The San Miguel Watershed is known for its spectacular outdoor amenities and resources. The recent increase in visitation to these areas along with the proliferation of different and sometimes incompatible user groups have made it apparent that now, more than ever, it is time for residents, public land management agencies, and users of public lands to better communicate, collaborate, and build bridges rather than increase conflict. One thing everyone can agree on is that we all love this region and its public lands, but where we need help is learning how to work together with other land users and land agencies to better understand diverse interests and accomplish organizational goals.

It is with this background that the Telluride Foundation is applying for the Colorado Parks and Wildlife "Colorado Outdoor Regional Partnerships" grant to form a Coalition of organizations and individuals that represent a broad range of outdoor and trails related interests focused in San Miguel and west Montrose counties. The Coalition will build and expand on the Telluride Foundation's existing Regional Trails Coalition, and will include motorized trails groups, nonmotorized groups, land and wildlife advocates, recreation advocates, tourism and economic development groups, community centered organizations, public land managers, ranchers, and local government representatives.

A key goal of the Coalition will be to craft a strategic plan to serve as a resource for all groups when new projects are in the pipeline. This strategic playbook will include best practices and guidelines as identified by the Coalition, with the ultimate goal of enhancing our outdoor recreation economies while simultaneously protecting public lands and wildlife.

Many organizations in our region are familiar with the time consuming and expensive process behind trails/outdoor recreation planning. We often see recreation groups far into their planning processes, only to encounter wildlife and land concerns after money and time have been spent. While these wildlife concerns are valid and should be voiced, ideally, they would be expressed earlier in the process to allow recreation groups to pivot. We hope that by building collaboration and enhancing communication between a variety of organizations, wildlife and conservation concerns can be addressed in the early stages of planning so that groups may restructure their projects. As a Coalition, our region will be able to better manage the increased usage of our local public lands through trail development and maintenance, while protecting vulnerable public lands and wildlife.

Projects that are reviewed by and have the support of a Coalition as a whole will have a better chance of success gaining public land agency approvals and competing for funding. If land agencies, conservation groups, hunters and anglers, etc. are all in support of a trail proposal, there will likely be fewer obstacles and delays throughout the planning process. Coalition meetings will provide the opportunity to build relationships and ensure that organizations and interests are invited to the table to express their concerns or

comments in the early stages of planning, as opposed to later in the process after resources have already been allocated.

Coalition meetings will occur on a monthly basis over the course of the next two years, taking place in different locations across both San Miguel and west Montrose counties, with the option to join via Zoom. The Telluride Foundation will hire contractor(s) to manage the project, facilitate meetings, create agendas, develop and write the strategic plan with Coalition input, and create a communicative environment at the monthly meetings, during which organizations can foster positive relationships and build trust with their counterparts. This will allow for conflicting interests and priorities to be addressed respectfully and appropriately. Plus, when new funding and grant opportunities are identified, there may be potential for project collaboration within the Coalition.
